Local energy



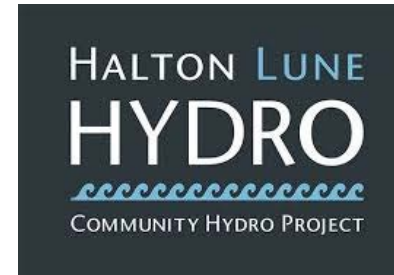
Encompasses community energy projects and includes activities by a wider set of local partners such as local authorities, housing associations, intermediary or advisory organisations and local businesses

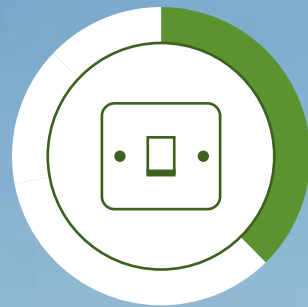

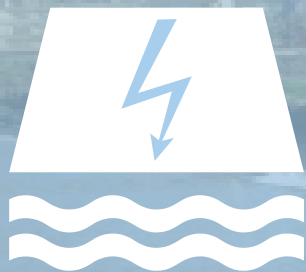

Project name	Applicant	Location	Summary	Amount
Energy Local Alston Moor	Alston Moor Community Energy	Cumbria	This project will investigate how to bring a hydro scheme into community ownership and use the Energy Local model for the first time in our region to develop the business case. It will also transfer skills from the Energy Local team to community energy groups in Cumbria.	£15,000
Eco Warriors	Burnley Boys and Girls Club	Lancashire	This project is led by the girls and boys and will give them the knowledge and skills to reduce their own carbon footprint and to become eco warriors in their community. The funding will also be used to reduce the carbon footprint of their facilities and is being co-funded by the sale of their mini-bus which the girls and boys decided to sell to reduce their carbon footprint.	£15,000
Warm Homes for All	Carbon Coop	Greater Manchester	This project will develop a new user-led approach to deliver energy efficiency measures to households, particularly those in fuel poverty in partnership with the local authority, the community and local suppliers.	£14,720
Fuel Katao, Paisay Bachao (Cut fuel, save money)	Kashmir Youth Project	Lancashire	Bi-lingual energy efficiency advice and tools for the Kashmir community in Rochdale.	£8,280
Community-owned energy supply	Burneside Community Energy	Cumbria	This project will develop the business case for community-owned energy assets to supply a new housing development in Burneside, Cumbria for the benefit of the whole village.	£15,000
Provision of electronic displays for solar generation	Oldham Community Power	Greater Manchester	Electronic displays for four schools with community-owned solar panels to show the children how they work and engage them on energy issues.	£3,000

Alston Moor Community Energy

Energy Local Alston Moor – £15,000



Investigation into the feasibility of bringing a hydro scheme into community ownership to benefit the local community



Model helps communities get more value from small-scale renewable generation by using the electricity locally, retains investment locally and helps the fuel poor



Will engage local people in community-owned energy, reduce net electricity costs and create a small amount of local employment

Community-owned Energy Supply – £15,000



Business case to supply community-owned renewable energy for new housing in Burneside, Cumbria for the benefit of the whole village



New houses will be as energy efficient as possible, scheme will then reduce fuel poverty by offering cheaper electricity to other local homes



Investment opportunity for local shareholders, reduces CO₂ emissions, generates vital funds to support local projects and helps customers be more energy efficient

Warm Homes for All – £14,720



A model for funding energy efficiency schemes which benefits vulnerable and fuel poor customers and invests in the local community

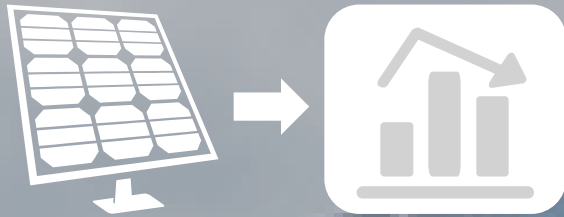


Research and workshops with local council, supply chain and customers to develop high-performing energy efficiency projects



Will share learning on how community energy organisations can collaborate with local institutions to deliver effective energy efficiency schemes

Provision of electronic displays for solar generation – £3,000



Installation of electronic displays at four local schools which will provide information about their solar panels and the energy they generate



The screens will relay information about the electricity generated from the schools' solar panels to engage the school children and the local community



The screens will act as a constant reminder of climate change and the importance of sustainable energy, and will promote benefits of community energy
